

Bonanza Kennel Club General Meeting Minutes November 1, 2022

Meeting called to order by President Candy Roper at 7:02 p.m.

Motion Vikki Jaramillo, second Yvonne Roscoe, to approve the October minutes as published in the newsletter. Motion passed unanimously.

Secretary reports: None

Treasurer report:

Lexine Thompson reported the beginning balance was \$30,751.32 with income of \$5,092.90, mainly RV parking and vendor booths. Expenses of \$1,721.37, which are mostly show expenses, telephone, and website, for an ending balance of \$34,122.85.

Candy gave Lexine checks tonight for the following: \$904.00 from MB-F for the balance from the shows; \$180.00 from Truckee Meadows Dog Training Club for 36 ACT runs which included 36 runs, 19 qualifiers, and 5 new titles; and \$753.00 from the Parks Department for refunds which included \$500.00 for the garbage cans. Thank you, Ann Kinney, for all your hard work with the garbage cleanup.

Committees

Show Committee:

Candy wrote the Health Department to find out if Bonanza Kennel Club needs a kitchen permit for the shows. They are researching and were surprised we had an issue. Candy told her there was confusion about needing a permit to serve our workers. Candy and Cindra Smith want to make sure there aren't any problems next year.

Gold Dust West finally sent the invoice for judges' rooms totaling approximately \$2,400. That includes rooms for specialty clubs that will reimburse Bonanza Kennel Club. Candy will invoice the specialty clubs for the reimbursements.

Candy has not yet sent the application to AKC for next year's show or the completed contract back to MB-F. We still have time but with everything going on she hasn't been able to get it done. They will be sent by the end of the year.

Nominating Committee:

The committee, consisting of Marian Panter, Thea Tsurumoto, and Ann Kinney, submitted their selections for next year. The current board accepted nominations for next year.

Lexine will do ballots for the January meeting.

Bob Kinney couldn't be here tonight as Ann's mother came home from the hospital today. She is now in hospice.

Unfinished Business:

Marion asked about the status on the 501(C)3. Lexine is working on it with the accountant, and we are pushing to make sure we can have the tax year end the same as our annual year as in the Bylaws, which is a calendar year. Candy said we need to get it finished before the Bylaws are accepted by AKC. AKC has not acknowledged they have reviewed them yet. The Bylaws need to reflect the calendar year for taxes. Marion Panter talked about needing to be nonprofit for donations.

Candy found a list of donors to the Nevada Day Parade. We have to wait until we get the 501(C)3 but we have list of businesses that may help with donations. Candy said Mo Shannon has shown an interest in fundraising, we might be able to put her on our fundraising committee.

New Business:

Cindra asked if we have ever talked about being in the Nevada Day Parade. Candy said it has been mentioned in the past but we have not pursued it. Someone posted on our Facebook page yesterday that we should consider doing it. One of the main reasons we have not participated is because it is so close to our show and we haven't had anyone to organize being in the parade. Now we have more people willing to work that could organize it.

Candy mentioned the Parks Department does a program at Mills Park called "Boo-nanza" around Halloween. They have booths and give out candy to kids but we could have brochures we could pass out and have dogs in costumes to draw attention to the club. Cindra asked why couldn't we sponsor a dog costume contest, maybe for a particular age group that Bonanza Kennel Club sponsors. Candy said there isn't any reason we couldn't if we can get someone to volunteer. "Boo-nanza" is just one night from 4-7 p.m.

Do we want to participate in the Al Lockett show again next year? Motion Marion Panter, second Cindra Smith, that we participate in the Al Lockett show. The demos were a big help in getting our booth some attention last year. The dates are March 31, 2023 - April 2, 2023, and the show is a go. The motion passed unanimously.

Candy posted some information on our Facebook page about FIT Dog program and got a response from the 4-H leader in Carson City. They are interested in the FIT Dog program and asked who they need to contact for an evaluator. Candy spoke with Thea Tsurumoto and looked on the AKC website which requires you do their online class to become an evaluator. Candy emailed AKC as to how you find an instructor or evaluator and explained we have a club member who is a CGC and Trick Dog evaluator. She asked if that person can sign off on FIT Dog. AKC said yes. Cindra asked if 4-H knows they have to register their dogs with AKC. Thea said she told them they had to for CGC. Is there someone to help 4-H with that process? Thea said they have to do the paperwork themselves. Thea gave them the paperwork but doesn't know if any followed up. Candy thinks we should jump on it while 4-H is interested. Their new leader is Alicia Henderson and maybe Thea could follow-up with her to see how many kids may still need assistance.

FIT Dog includes things such as taking walks and participating in Turkey Trots. Thea already has her Turkey Trot medal by walking 1.3 miles three times which is a 5K. You sign up for \$20.00 and get a medal. It would be an easy title for kids to get. You need documentation as you complete activities. There are quite a few activities you can do to earn points. Candy will contact AKC again to clearly define that Thea doesn't have to take the online class to be able to become an evaluator.

At our last show, one 4-H member helped steward in the obedience ring on Saturday. It will be easier to get 4-H kids showing in Juniors hopefully with the AKC rule change that juniors do not have to own the dog they are showing. When Thea was working with some of the kids, it was their parents' dog so the parent would have to walk with them. Nancy Hurwitz asked if the dog can be neutered or spayed because her dog will do anything for food but he is neutered. The dog can be neutered or spayed in juniors so he could be used.

Vikki Jaramillo talked about the Pee Wee class and Candy said she thinks they can be 5-9 years old. We should look at it for our next show. Vikki said maybe some of the juniors / 4-H members have younger brothers or sisters that would be interested. Thea said it is difficult because they have to be taught conformation. At Truckee Meadows they have to be 11 or 12 years old before they can do anything with a dog. It makes it hard to help them learn when they can't start until they are 11. Marion asked how we can reach out and find kids that are interested. Vikki said she would help work with kids. Candy thinks we should start with 4-H. Cindra was thinking about grade schools and Marion suggested PTA meetings. You have to convince the parents to get the kids involved.

Vikki was a K-9 ambassador for several years back east and would go to schools with her Siberian. Bonanza Kennel Club has never had one, but Candy thinks they still have the program. Cindra said it would help with looking good to the Legislature by having our presence in the community helping to educate.

We need to find someone to replace Tony Yarbrough for the legislative position to watch legislation this next session. He would read everything from front to finish to make sure there wasn't anything about animal issues in bills.

In the early 1990's Cindra was going into judging and went out to judge a 4-H match. She found the kids and dogs were so unprepared. She didn't want to fail them but a young boy with a Basset couldn't even get it in the ring. Their dogs didn't know any basic skills.

Marion asked if we need a committee. It would be a good idea to form a committee to see how we could reach out to the community in general like the Nevada Day Parade and “Boo-nanza” or reaching out to juniors. We might need to eventually make it two different committees. Candy asked if we had 3-4 members to be on a committee to do this. We can think about this and put it in the newsletter to try to get volunteers. Thea said she has offered to help 4-H with agility but hasn’t had any interest. We don’t have a meeting next month, but Candy will put it in the next few newsletters.

Vikki said AKC has programs for mixed breeds so maybe we could try to get new members with mixed breeds involved in Bonanza Kennel Club. The only thing a mixed breed can’t compete in is conformation and herding. Could we do something at our show for fun. Candy said AKC won’t allow us to do that. There was discussion as to what we may be able to come up with and discuss it at the next meeting.

Candy said Elaine Oxborrow is hoping to get 40 cable guard ramps for our shows donated from the Grand Sierra Resort. We need someone to store them. If someone can store them, they can be stacked. The trailer is too full. We need to go through the trailer maybe at the match or do a work day to clean and reorganize. Maybe go out to Carolyn’s in Washoe in March or April before our match in July.

Class Dogs Have the Opportunity to Earn Championship Points for Group 2/3/4

Effective January 1, 2023, dogs entered in regular classes will have the opportunity to earn championship points for Group 2, 3, and 4 placements. As defined in Chapter 16, Section 2 of the [AKC Rules Applying to Dog Shows](#), a dog in its breed competition at a show which has placed Winners, and which also has finished second, third, or fourth in its group competition at the same show shall be awarded championship points figured at the highest point rating of any breed or recognized variety of any breed entered in the show and entitled to winners points in its group, exclusive of any breed or variety that placed higher in the group class.



For this resolution to stick, I need my humans to block my access to the box, either with baby gates or a covered/top-entry litter box. The cat would appreciate the privacy too.


4. Stop Begging for Food

Owners of Border Collies and Shetland Sheepdogs

The Dog Genome Project at the National Institutes of Health is studying repetitive behaviors in certain herding breeds. Some Border Collies and Shetland Sheepdogs exhibit behaviors such as intense fixation on lights or shadows; pacing, circling, or spinning; excessive grooming; or nipping at humans or other pets to elicit movement. While dogs of any breed may occasionally engage in these behaviors, certain dogs will perform these behaviors at a greater frequency, intensity, or duration greater than other dogs.

The study, headed by Dr. Dayna Dreger, is in need of data and DNA samples from Border Collies and Shetland Sheepdogs. All owners of these breeds are invited to complete an online behavior survey, whether or not your dog exhibits these behaviors. Some owners may then be asked to submit a DNA sample from their dog.
